Today in Columbus History: On Saturday, June 2, 1832, an administrator's notice regarding the estate of Sowell Woolfolk appeared in the *Columbus Enquirer*. Gen. Woolfolk was dead. A few months earlier, on January 22, he'd been killed in a duel at Ft. Mitchell by Maj. Joseph T. Camp. Their argument went back to a disagreement they'd had years before when they both served in the Georgia legislature. Woolfolk was shot though the chest and died immediately; Camp was shot in the abdomen but recovered. Gen. Woolfolk had a big funeral with lots of attendees; he was buried in the City Cemetery [Linwood]. Curiously, he is in an unmarked grave. Joseph Camp ended up in another duel a year later – again in Ft. Mitchell. He was fatally shot by one John Milton. Camp is buried in Linwood – with a nice monument. Milton was acquitted and left town for Florida, where he later served as governor 1861 – 1865. He was found in his office April 1, 1865, with a bullet to the head, an apparent suicide.

This is therefore to cite and admonish all and singular the kindred and creditors of said deceased, to be and appear at my office within the time prescribed by law, to shew cause, if any they have, why said letters should not be granted.


Given under my hand at office, this 16th May, 1832. JOHN TOWNSEND, c. c. o. May 19-1

The inscription on the west side of the Camp obelisk reads as follows:

Sacred to The Memory of Joseph Thomas Camp This monument Has been erected by his afflicted friends in honor of his manly virtues, and as a testimonial of their grief at his untimely Death He was born in Nottaway County, State of Virginia On the 30th day of April 1800, and departed this life at Columbus On the 12th day of August 1833. Aged 33 years
