Today in Columbus History:

On July 2, 1914, the *Columbus Daily Enquirer-Sun,* ran an ad for the American Theater highlighting "The Trunk Mystery" a film featuring Columbus-born actress Justina Huff playing Susan, the maid. She was the oldest daughter of Thomas Daniel Huff and Lucinda Salisbury. Her grandfather was Col. William L. Salisbury. Justina's younger sister Louise Huff was the more famous of the two Huff sisters and enjoyed a longer career on both the screen and Broadway stage.

Both girls were born in Columbus (Justina in 1893 and Louise in 1895) but moved to New York with their parents by 1908. Their father died in 1910 and the children needed to find ways to support themselves and their family. By 1912, Louise was part of a traveling theater company and Justina was teaching school. In 1913, they both moved to film.

Justina's first two movies appeared in Columbus without mentioning her involvement. Her first film was for the Edison Co. entitled "*The Diamond Crown*." It was a Kate Kirby mystery starring Laura Sawyer with Justina playing the maid. Her second film was *Tess of the D'Urbervilles*, starring Minnie Maddern Fiske for Famous Players Studio where she played Liza Lou. Later that year, she and Louise moved to the Lubin studio near Philadelphia where she eventually took on leading roles, appearing in 40 movies there. Justina and Louise worked closely with Edgar Jones, an actor and director who married Louise in 1914. Justina married John P. Chapman a doctor in Philadelphia in 1915 and vowed to continue working afterwards.

The studio fell on hard times after a fire destroyed almost their entire film archive. Lubin went bankrupt in 1916, but not before Jones and Huff sisters found work at other studios. Justina joined Universal and made the film *The Man Inside* in 1916 before retiring to take care of her growing family. She had a son John in 1916 and a daughter Sally in 1918.

Justina's husband was a successful doctor and the medical examiner for the state board of narcotics as well as the medical director for several life insurance companies. Justina and her husband relocated to the Balearic Island of Majorca in Spain by the mid-1950s. Dr. Chapman died while visiting Ireland in 1968 and Justina remained in Majorca until about 1975, when she returned to Philadelphia.

She moved into the Saunders House nursing home where Clason Kyle interviewed her in November 1975 for his Kyle Style feature in the *Sunday Ledger Enquirer*. She died in June of 1977. Although her entire filmography appears to be lost, she wrote a letter in 1973 to one of her fans where is implied that she had an uncredited role in *The Prisoner of Zenda* in 1913. This film survives and might be the only example of her on screen in existence.

Today, the Columbus Museum maintains a collection of Louise Huff memorabilia and is co-sponsoring a project, through the Historic Columbus Foundation to erect a historical marker in front of the Huff sisters' childhood home in the historic district.






