
Today in Columbus History: On August 21, 1874, an ad appeared in the *Columbus Daily Enquirer* for the sale of a downtown property that was located adjacent to one of Columbus's most magnificent houses: the Martin J. Crawford House. Located at 209 13thSt., Crawford's two-storied brick and cement home had a second-floor gallery on three sides. Built in the 1840s, the home, with its 12-inch-thick walls, was purchased by Crawford shortly after moving to Columbus from Hamilton in 1849. Crawford was a practicing attorney, judge, U.S. Representative and one of three Peace Commissioners sent by Jefferson Davis to Washington to meet with President Lincoln to try to reach an agreement on slavery. The Crawford House is believed to be the meeting place of the last meeting of the Confederate Cabinet – attended by Alexander Stephens, Robert Toombs, Crawford and others. Sadly, the house was razed n 1949 – to make way for "automotive progress," according to Etta Worsley. She added that "It was like throwing away the family portraits."







The magnificent Crawford House ca. 1933 -- from Historic American Buildings Survey.
