Today in Columbus History: On August 28, 1890, an impressive ad appeared in the *Columbus Enquirer-Sun* announcing the opening of the Chattahoochee Valley Exposition, Nov. 5 – 15 at the South Commons The first such exposition took place in 1888, after a group of local businessmen proposed the grand scheme. They built a magnificent hall to house the event – providing space for agricultural displays, manufacturing displays, military parades, lots of food and races of all types—including horse racing. There was something for everyone. Over the years, the exposition became the "Chattahoochee Valley Fair" – adding a midway of carnival rides and sideshows. By the 1990s, the quality of the fair had deteriorated and in 1997 it closed shop. "The Greater Columbus Fair" sprang into existence after that and continued providing the "fair" experience for Columbus residents, as late as 2019.


